NATIONAL PROHIBITION INTO EFFECT TONIGHT

United States Enters Great Drought at Midnight Tonight—Manufacture and Sale of Beverages Containing More than One-Half of One Percent Alcohol Prohibited by Constitutional Amendment—Home Stocks Not to be Molested.

Constitutional prohibition, effective at midnight tonight, and the enforcement of it, will make the following provisions: (1) No person shall manufacture, sell, transport, or import into any State, Territory, or District of Columbia, any beverage containing more than one-half of one percent of alcohol.

Prohibition is established from prescribing alcoholic liquor for medical purposes in any State, Territory, or District of Columbia. (2) No person shall possess more than one quart of any alcoholic beverage for his personal use.

For the United States, Mr. Roper will have under him nine federal supervisors in charge of as many districts, a director for each state and a director for each territory.

Approximately 500,000,000 in taxes has been collected annually on alcoholic beverages, which now will be obtained by the government in some other way.

Thousands of gallons of whiskey remain in bonded warehouses with no chance to be used in preventing any more of the liquor from being used in the medicinal and scientific uses with the Nation.

With Revenue Department. Enforcement of constitutional prohibition was signed by Congress with the Bureau of Internal Revenue which for years has been in charge of the collection of excise taxes and active in running down "bootleggers".

AMENDMENT WINS IN INDIANA ASSEMBLY

Indiana Legislature Meets in Special Session to Consider Ratification of Woman Suffrage Amendment to United States Constitution—Vote in Favor of Amendment Is Overwhelming—Governor Goodrich Asks Speedy Consideration of Matter.

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 15.—(United Press.)—The Indiana legislature today ratified the amendment to the federal constitution, enfranchising women.

By a vote of 33 to 2 the house of representatives adopted the amendment after it had been passed by the senate by a vote of 43 to 2.

Indiana is the twenty-sixth state to ratify the suffrage amendment.

Members of the legislature were pledged by the suffrage and by law to take no other legislative action and the session was adjourned at 12:30 this afternoon.

Governor Goodrich and Lieutenant Governor Bush both urged adoption of the resolution before the session opened for business.

All seats in the gallery and along the walls surrounding the chamber were taken in a few minutes.
